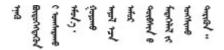

- 4. Check inside the server for any obvious unsafe conditions, such as metal filings, contamination, water or other liquid, or signs of fire or smoke damage.
- 5. Check for worn, frayed, or pinched cables.
- 6. Make sure that the power-supply cover fasteners (screws or rivets) have not been removed or tampered with.

The ThinkSystem™ SR650 server is a 2U rack server designed for performance and expansion for various IT workloads. With the modular design, the server is flexible to be customized for maximum storage capacity or high storage density with selectable input/output options and tiered system management.

#### Identifying your server

The machine type and serial number are on the ID label on the right rack latch in the front of the server.




Figure 1. Location of the ID label

The XClarity® Controller network access label is attached on the top side of the pull-out information tab. After you get the server, peel the XClarity Controller network access label away and store it in a safe place.

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


Figure 2. Location of the XClarity Controller network access label

#### **Update method terminology**

- **In-band update**. The installation or update is performed using a tool or application within an operating system that is executing on the server's core CPU.
- Out-of-band update. The installation or update is performed by the Lenovo XClarity Controller collecting the update and then directing the update to the target subsystem or device. Out-of-band updates have no dependency on an operating system executing on the core CPU. However, most out-of-band operations do require the server to be in the S0 (Working) power state.
- On-Target update. The installation or update is initiated from an Operating System executing on the server's operating system.
- **Off-Target update.** The installation or update is initiated from a computing device interacting directly with the server's Lenovo XClarity Controller.
- UpdateXpress System Packs (UXSPs). UXSPs are bundled updates designed and tested to provide the interdependent level of functionality, performance, and compatibility. UXSPs are server machine-type specific and are built (with firmware and device driver updates) to support specific Windows Server, Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL) and SUSE Linux Enterprise Server (SLES) operating system distributions. Machine-type-specific firmware-only UXSPs are also available.

#### Turn on the server

After the server performs a short self-test (power status LED flashes quickly) when connected to input power, it enters a standby state (power status LED flashes once per second).

The server can be turned on (power LED on) in any of the following ways:

- You can press the power button.
- The server can restart automatically after a power interruption.
- The server can respond to remote power-on requests sent to the Lenovo XClarity Controller.

### Turn off the server

The server remains in a standby state when it is connected to a power source, allowing the Lenovo XClarity Controller to respond to remote power-on requests. To remove all power from the server (power status LED off), you must disconnect all power cables.

To place the server in a standby state (power status LED flashes once per second):

**Note:** The Lenovo XClarity Controller can place the server in a standby state as an automatic response to a critical system failure.

- Start an orderly shutdown using the operating system (if supported by your operating system).
- Press the power button to start an orderly shutdown (if supported by your operating system).
- Press and hold the power button for more than 4 seconds to force a shutdown.

When in a standby state, the server can respond to remote power-on requests sent to the Lenovo XClarity Controller. For information about powering on the server, see "Turn on the server" on page 20.

# Chapter 2. Server components

This section provides information to help you locate your server components.

# **Front view**

The front view of the server varies by model.

The illustrations in this topic show the server front views based on the supported drive bays.

#### Notes:

- Your server might look different from the illustrations in this topic.
- The chassis for sixteen 2.5-inch-drive bays cannot be upgraded to the chassis for twenty-four 2.5-inch-drive bays.




Figure 4. Front view of server models with eight 2.5-inch drive bays (0–7)




Figure 5. Front view of server models with sixteen 2.5-inch drive bays (0–15)

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


Figure 6. Front view of server models with twenty 2.5-inch drive bays (0–19)




Figure 7. Front view of server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch drive bays (0–23)




Figure 8. Front view of server models with eight 3.5-inch drive bays (0–7)




Figure 9. Front view of server models with twelve 3.5-inch drive bays (0–11)

#### Front I/O assembly

#### B Rack latches

If your server is installed in a rack, you can use the rack latches to help you slide the server out of the rack. You also can use the rack latches and screws to secure the server in the rack so that the server cannot slide out, especially in vibration-prone areas. For more information, refer to the Rack Installation Guide that comes with your rail kit.

#### Drive bays

The number of the installed drives in your server varies by model. When you install drives, follow the order of the drive bay numbers.

The EMI integrity and cooling of the server are protected by having all drive bays occupied. The vacant drive bays must be occupied by drive bay fillers or drive fillers.

#### **VGA** connector (available on some models)

Used to attach a high-performance monitor, a direct-drive monitor, or other devices that use a VGA connector.




Figure 10. Front I/O assembly for server models with eight 3.5-inch-drive bays, eight 2.5-inch-drive bays, and sixteen 2.5inch-drive bays




Figure 11. Front I/O assembly for server models with twelve 3.5-inch-drive bays and twenty-four 2.5-inch-drive bays

#### **■ XClarity Controller USB connector**

Depending on the setting, this connector supports USB 2.0 function, XClarity Controller management function, or both.

- If the connector is set for USB 2.0 function, you can attach a device that requires a USB 2.0 connection, such as a keyboard, a mouse, or a USB storage device.
- If the connector is set for XClarity Controller management function, you can attach a mobile device installed with the application to run XClarity Controller event logs.
- If the connector is set to have both functions, you can press the system ID button for three seconds to switch between the two functions.

#### **USB 3.0 connector**

Used to attach a device that requires a USB 2.0 or 3.0 connection, such as a keyboard, a mouse, or a USB storage device.

#### Power button with power status LED

You can press the power button to turn on the server when you finish setting up the server. You also can hold the power button for several seconds to turn off the server if you cannot turn off the server from the operating system. The power status LED helps you to determine the current power status.




Figure 12. Rear view of server models with six PCle slots




Figure 13. Rear view of server models with two rear 3.5-inch drive bays (12/13 or 24/25) and three PCIe slots

### **■** Ethernet connectors on the LOM adapter (available on some models)

The LOM adapter provides two or four extra Ethernet connectors for network connections.

The leftmost Ethernet connector on the LOM adapter can be set as XClarity Controller network connector. To set the Ethernet connector as XClarity Controller network connector, start Setup utility, go to **BMC Settings** → **Network Settings** → **Network Interface Port** and select **Shared**. Then, go to **Shared NIC on** and select **PHY card**.

### **XClarity Controller network connector**

Used to attach an Ethernet cable to manage the system using XClarity Controller.

#### **USA** connector

Used to attach a high-performance monitor, a direct-drive monitor, or other devices that use a VGA connector.

### **USB 3.0 connectors (2)**

Used to attach a device that requires a USB 2.0 or 3.0 connection, such as a keyboard, a mouse, or a USB storage device.

#### MMI button

Press this button to force a nonmaskable interrupt (NMI) to the processor. By this way, you can blue screen the server and take a memory dump. You might have to use a pen or the end of a straightened paper clip to press the button.

### Power supply 1 Power supply 2 (available on some models)

The hot-swap redundant power supplies help you avoid significant interruption to the operation of the system when a power supply fails. You can purchase a power supply option from Lenovo and install the power supply to provide power redundancy without turning off the server.

On each power supply, there are three status LEDs near the power cord connector. For information about the status LEDs, see "Rear view LEDs" on page 31.




Figure 14. Rear view LEDs of the server




Figure 15. System board components




Figure 16. System board LEDs




Figure 17. System board jumpers




Some of the components in the server have internal cables and cable connectors.

To connect cables, observe the following guidelines:

- Turn off the server before you connect or disconnect any internal cables.
- See the documentation that comes with any external devices for additional cabling instructions. It might be easier for you to route cables before you connect the devices to the server.
- Cable identifiers of some cables are printed on the cables that come with the server and optional devices. Use these identifiers to connect the cables to the correct connectors.
- Ensure that the cable is not pinched and does not cover any connectors or obstruct any components on the system board.
- Ensure that the relevant cables pass through the cable clips.

**Note:** Disengage all latches, release tabs, or locks on cable connectors when you disconnect cables from the system board. Failing to release them before removing the cables will damage the cable sockets on the system board, which are fragile. Any damage to the cable sockets might require replacing the system board.




Figure 18. VGA connector cable routing




Figure 19. Cable routing for the front I/O assembly on the chassis




Figure 20. Cable routing for the front I/O assembly on the right rack latch




Figure 21. Cable routing for server models with up to two GPUs




Figure 22. Cable routing for server models with up to three GPUs




Figure 23. Cable routing for server models with two Cambricon MLU100-C3 processing adapters




Figure 24. Cable routing for server models with four Cambricon MLU100-C3 processing adapters




Figure 25. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 26. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 27. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 28. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and two 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 29. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, and one 730-8i 4G Flash SAS/SATA RAID adapter with CacheCade




Figure 30. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, Intel Xeon 6137, 6242R, 6246R, 6248R, 6250, 6256, or 6258R processors, and one 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 31. Cable routing for server models with four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and two 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 32. Cable routing for server models with four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 33. Cable routing for server models with four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 34. Cable routing for server models with four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 35. Cable routing for server models with four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, Intel Xeon 6137, 6242R, 6246R, 6248R, 6250, 6256, or 6258R processors, and one 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 36. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 37. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one Gen 3 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one Gen 3 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 38. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one Gen 4 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one Gen 4 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 39. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 40. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 41. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and three 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 42. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 43. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 44. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 45. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 46. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 47. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 48. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 49. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe 1611–8P switch adapter




Figure 50. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 51. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, three 8i HBA/RAID adapters, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 52. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 24i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 53. Cable routing for server models with eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 32i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 54. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch NVMe drives, two NVMe 810-4P switch adapters, and two NVMe 1610-4P switch adapters




Figure 55. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch NVMe drives, and two NVMe 1611-8P switch adapters




Figure 56. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch NVMe drives, two NVMe 810-4P switch adapters, and three NVMe 1610-4P switch adapters




Figure 57. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 58. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 59. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 60. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and four 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 61. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, two 8i HBA/RAID adapters, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 62. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 63. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 64. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and two 16i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 65. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 66. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 67. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 68. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and four 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 69. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, two 8i HBA/RAID adapters, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 70. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 24i RAID adapter




Figure 71. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 32i RAID adapter




Figure 72. Cable routing for server models with twenty 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and two 16i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 73. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 24i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 74. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 32i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 75. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 32i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe 1611-8P switch adapter




Figure 76. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 24i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 77. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe 1611-8P switch adapter




Figure 78. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 32i RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 79. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, two 16i RAID adapters, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 80. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, two 8i HBA/RAID adapters, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe switch adapter




Figure 81. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 24i RAID adapter, and two NVMe switch adapters




Figure 82. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 32i RAID adapter, and two NVMe switch adapters




Figure 83. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 32i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe 1611-8P switch adapter




Figure 84. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, three 8i HBA/RAID adapters, and two NVMe switch adapters




Figure 85. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 16i HBA/RAID adapters, and two NVMe switch adapters




Figure 86. Cable routing for server models with twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, twelve 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, one 16i HBA/RAID adapter, and one NVMe 1611-8P switch adapter




Figure 87. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch NVMe drives, eight SAS/SATA drives, two NVMe 810-4P switch adapters, two NVMe 1610-4P switch adapters and one 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 88. Cable routing for server models with sixteen 2.5-inch NVMe drives, eight 2.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and two NVMe 1611-8P switch adapters




Figure 89. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch NVMe drives, four NVMe 810-4P switch adapters, and one NVMe 1610-8P switch adapter




Figure 90. Cable routing for server models with twenty-four 2.5-inch NVMe drives and three NVMe 1611-8P switch adapters




Figure 91. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and two 8i HBA/RAID adapters




Figure 92. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 93. Cable routing for server models with twelve 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 3 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 94. Cable routing for server models with twelve 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 4 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 95. Cable routing for server models with twelve 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, one 8i HBA/RAID adapter, and one 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 96. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 3.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 3 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 97. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 3.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 4 16i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 98. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 3.5-inch NVMe drives, and one 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 99. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 3.5-inch NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 3 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 100. Cable routing for server models with eight 3.5-inch SAS/SATA drives, four 3.5-inch NVMe drives, the rear hot-swap drive assembly, and one Gen 4 8i HBA/RAID adapter




Figure 101. Server components

- For your safety, a power cord with a grounded attachment plug is provided to use with this product. To avoid electrical shock, always use the power cord and plug with a properly grounded outlet.
- Power cords for this product that are used in the United States and Canada are listed by Underwriter's Laboratories (UL) and certified by the Canadian Standards Association (CSA).
- For units intended to be operated at 115 volts: Use a UL-listed and CSA-certified cord set consisting of a minimum 18 AWG, Type SVT or SJT, three-conductor cord, a maximum of 15 feet in length and a parallel blade, grounding-type attachment plug rated 15 amperes, 125 volts.
- For units intended to be operated at 230 volts (U.S. use): Use a UL-listed and CSA-certified cord set consisting of a minimum 18 AWG, Type SVT or SJT, three-conductor cord, a maximum of 15 feet in length and a tandem blade, grounding-type attachment plug rated 15 amperes, 250 volts.
- For units intended to be operated at 230 volts (outside the U.S.): Use a cord set with a grounding-type attachment plug. The cord set should have the appropriate safety approvals for the country in which the equipment will be installed.

This section provides installation and removal procedures for all serviceable system components. Each component replacement procedure references any tasks that need to be performed to gain access to the component being replaced.

**Note:** If you replace a part, such as an adapter, that contains firmware, you might also need to update the firmware for that part. For more information about updating firmware, see "Firmware updates" on page 16.

### **Installation Guidelines**

Before installing components in your server, read the installation guidelines.

Before installing optional devices, read the following notices carefully:

**Attention:** Prevent exposure to static electricity, which might lead to system halt and loss of data, by keeping static-sensitive components in their static-protective packages until installation, and handling these devices with an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system.

- Read the safety information and guidelines to ensure that you work safely.
  - A complete list of safety information for all products is available at:

  - The following guidelines are available as well: "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 158 and "Working inside the server with the power on" on page 157.
- Make sure the components you are installing are supported by the server. For a list of supported optional components for the server, see <a href="https://static.lenovo.com/us/en/serverproven/index.shtml">https://static.lenovo.com/us/en/serverproven/index.shtml</a>.
- When you install a new server, download and apply the latest firmware. This will help ensure that any
  known issues are addressed, and that your server is ready to work with optimal performance. Go to
  ThinkSystem SR650 Drivers and Software to download firmware updates for your server.

**Important:** Some cluster solutions require specific code levels or coordinated code updates. If the component is part of a cluster solution, verify that the latest level of code is supported for the cluster solution before you update the code.

- It is good practice to make sure that the server is working correctly before you install an optional component.
- Keep the working area clean, and place removed components on a flat and smooth surface that does not shake or tilt.
- Do not attempt to lift an object that might be too heavy for you. If you have to lift a heavy object, read the following precautions carefully:
  - Make sure that you can stand steadily without slipping.
  - Distribute the weight of the object equally between your feet.
  - Use a slow lifting force. Never move suddenly or twist when you lift a heavy object.
  - To avoid straining the muscles in your back, lift by standing or by pushing up with your leg muscles.
- Back up all important data before you make changes related to the disk drives.

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- Have a small flat-blade screwdriver, a small Phillips screwdriver, and a T8 torx screwdriver available.
- To view the error LEDs on the system board and internal components, leave the power on.
- You do not have to turn off the server to remove or install hot-swap power supplies, hot-swap fans, or hotplug USB devices. However, you must turn off the server before you perform any steps that involve removing or installing adapter cables, and you must disconnect the power source from the server before you perform any steps that involve removing or installing a riser card.
- Blue on a component indicates touch points, where you can grip to remove a component from or install it in the server, open or close a latch, and so on.
- The Red strip on the drives, adjacent to the release latch, indicates that the drive can be hot-swapped if
  the server and operating system support hot-swap capability. This means that you can remove or install
  the drive while the server is still running.

**Note:** See the system specific instructions for removing or installing a hot-swap drive for any additional procedures that you might need to perform before you remove or install the drive.

 After finishing working on the server, make sure you reinstall all safety shields, guards, labels, and ground wires.

## Safety inspection checklist

Use the information in this section to identify potentially unsafe conditions with your server. As each machine was designed and built, required safety items were installed to protect users and service technicians from injury.

#### Notes:

- The product is not suitable for use at visual display workplaces according to §2 of the Workplace Regulations.
- 2. The set-up of the server is made in the server room only.

### **CAUTION:**

This equipment must be installed or serviced by trained personnel, as defined by the NEC, IEC 62368-1 & IEC 60950-1, the standard for Safety of Electronic Equipment within the Field of Audio/Video, Information Technology and Communication Technology. Lenovo assumes you are qualified in the servicing of equipment and trained in recognizing hazards energy levels in products. Access to the equipment is by the use of a tool, lock and key, or other means of security, and is controlled by the authority responsible for the location.

**Important:** Electrical grounding of the server is required for operator safety and correct system function. Proper grounding of the electrical outlet can be verified by a certified electrician.

Use the following checklist to verify that there are no potentially unsafe conditions:

- 1. Make sure that the power is off and the power cord is disconnected.
- 2. Check the power cord.
  - Make sure that the third-wire ground connector is in good condition. Use a meter to measure thirdwire ground continuity for 0.1 ohm or less between the external ground pin and the frame ground.
  - Make sure that the power cord is the correct type.

- c. Enter the machine type and model for your server to display the configurator page.
- d. Click **Power → Power Cables** to see all line cords.
- Make sure that the insulation is not frayed or worn.
- 3. Check for any obvious non-Lenovo alterations. Use good judgment as to the safety of any non-Lenovo alterations.
- 4. Check inside the server for any obvious unsafe conditions, such as metal filings, contamination, water or other liquid, or signs of fire or smoke damage.
- 5. Check for worn, frayed, or pinched cables.
- 6. Make sure that the power-supply cover fasteners (screws or rivets) have not been removed or tampered with.

## System reliability guidelines

Review the system reliability guidelines to ensure proper system cooling and reliability.

Make sure the following requirements are met:

- When the server comes with redundant power, a power supply must be installed in each power-supply bav.
- Adequate space around the server must be spared to allow server cooling system to work properly. Leave approximately 50 mm (2.0 in.) of open space around the front and rear of the server. Do not place any object in front of the fans.
- For proper cooling and airflow, refit the server cover before you turn the power on. Do not operate the server for more than 30 minutes with the server cover removed, for it might damage server components.
- Cabling instructions that come with optional components must be followed.
- A failed fan must be replaced within 48 hours since malfunction.
- A removed hot-swap fan must be replaced within 30 seconds after removal.
- A removed hot-swap drive must be replaced within two minutes after removal.
- A removed hot-swap power supply must be replaced within two minutes after removal.
- Every air baffle that comes with the server must be installed when the server starts (some servers might come with more than one air baffle). Operating the server with a missing air baffle might damage the processor.
- All processor sockets must contain either a socket cover or a processor with heat sink.
- When more than one processor is installed, fan population rules for each server must be strictly followed.

# Working inside the server with the power on

You might need to keep the power on with the server cover removed to look at system information about the display panel or to replace hot-swap components. Review these guidelines before doing so.

**Attention:** The server might stop and loss of data might occur when internal server components are exposed to static electricity. To avoid this potential problem, always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding systems when working inside the server with the power on.

- Avoid loose-fitting clothing, particularly around your forearms. Button or roll up long sleeves before working inside the server.
- Prevent your necktie, scarf, badge rope, or long hair from dangling into the server.
- Remove jewelry, such as bracelets, necklaces, rings, cuff links, and wrist watches.
- Remove items from your shirt pocket, such as pens and pencils, in case they fall into the server as you lean over it.

Avoid dropping any metallic objects, such as paper clips, hairpins, and screws, into the server.

## Handling static-sensitive devices

Review these guidelines before you handle static-sensitive devices to reduce the possibility of damage from electrostatic discharge.

**Attention:** Prevent exposure to static electricity, which might lead to system halt and loss of data, by keeping static-sensitive components in their static-protective packages until installation, and handling these devices with an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system.

- Limit your movement to prevent building up static electricity around you.
- Take additional care when handling devices during cold weather, for heating would reduce indoor humidity and increase static electricity.
- Always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system, particularly when working inside the server with the power on.
- While the device is still in its static-protective package, touch it to an unpainted metal surface on the
  outside of the server for at least two seconds. This drains static electricity from the package and from your
  body.
- Remove the device from the package and install it directly into the server without putting it down. If it is
  necessary to put the device down, put it back into the static-protective package. Never place the device
  on the server or on any metal surface.
- When handling a device, carefully hold it by the edges or the frame.
- Do not touch solder joints, pins, or exposed circuitry.
- Keep the device from others' reach to prevent possible damages.




Figure 102. Unlocking the security bezel




Figure 103. Security bezel removal




Figure 104. Key removal




Figure 105. Security bezel installation




Figure 106. Locking the security bezel




Figure 107. ID label plate removal




Figure 108. Cable routing for the VGA connector and the front I/O assembly on rack latches




Figure 109. Cable retainer removal




Figure 110. Screws removal





Figure 111. Rack latch removal




Figure 112. Rack latch installation




Figure 113. Screws installation




Figure 114. Cable retainer installation




Figure 115. Cable routing for the VGA connector and the front I/O assembly on rack latches




Figure 116. ID label plate installation




Figure 117. Top cover removal




Figure 118. Top cover installation





Figure 119. RAID super capacitor module removal




Figure 120. RAID super capacitor module installation






Figure 121. Removal of the standard air baffle




Figure 122. Removal of the large-size air baffle




Figure 123. Plastic filler removal




Figure 124. Plastic filler installation




Figure 125. Installation of the standard air baffle




Figure 126. Installation of the large-size air baffle




Figure 127. Viewing the fan error LEDs from the top of the system fans




Figure 128. System fan removal




Figure 129. System fan installation







Figure 130. System fan cage removal




Figure 131. System fan cage installation




Figure 132. Front I/O assembly removal




Figure 133. Front I/O assembly installation




Figure 134. Opening the drive tray handle of a 2.5-inch hot-swap drive




Figure 135. Opening the drive tray handle of a 3.5-inch hot-swap drive




Figure 136. 2.5-inch hot-swap drive removal




Figure 137. 3.5-inch hot-swap drive removal




Figure 138. 2.5-inch drive filler removal




Figure 139. 3.5-inch drive filler removal




Figure 140. 2.5-inch hot-swap drive installation




Figure 141. 3.5-inch hot-swap drive installation






Figure 142. 2.5-inch-drive backplane installation




Figure 143. 3.5-inch-drive backplane removal



- If you are installing the 3.5-inch-drive backplane with expander and the 8i HBA/RAID adapter for the server models with twelve 3.5-inch-drive bays, GPU is not supported, the maximum supported processor TDP is 165 watts, and you need to create the RAID volume to avoid the disorder of the HDD sequence. Besides, if the rear hot-swap drive is installed, the server performance might be degraded.

Before installing the 3.5-inch-drive backplane, touch the static-protective package that contains the new backplane to any unpainted surface on the outside of the server. Then, take the new backplane out of the package and place it on a static-protective surface.




Figure 144. 3.5-inch-drive backplane installation



#### Attention:

- Disconnect all power cords for this task.
- If you are removing a DCPMM in App Direct or Mixed Memory Mode, make sure to back up the stored data, and delete any created namespace.
- memory modules are sensitive to static discharge and require special handling. In addition to the standard guidelines for "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 158:
  - Always wear an electrostatic-discharge strap when removing or installing memory modules.
     Electrostatic-discharge gloves can also be used.
  - Never hold two or more memory modules together so that they do not touch each other. Do not stack memory modules directly on top of each other during storage.
  - Never touch the gold memory module connector contacts or allow these contacts to touch the outside of the memory module connector housing.
  - Handle memory modules with care: never bend, twist, or drop a memory module.
  - Do not use any metal tools (such as jigs or clamps) to handle the memory modules, because the rigid metals may damage the memory modules.
  - Do not insert memory modules while holding packages or passive components, which can cause package cracks or detachment of passive components by the high insertion force.




Figure 145. memory module removal




Figure 146. memory module slots on the system board




Figure 147. memory module slots on the system board




Figure 148. memory module installation





Figure 149. RAID adapter removal




Figure 150. RAID adapter installation






Figure 151. CMOS battery removal






Figure 152. CMOS battery installation






Figure 153. Riser 1 assembly removal




Figure 154. Riser 2 assembly removal




Figure 155. Riser card removal




Figure 156. Riser card installation




Figure 157. Installing the screws to secure the riser card




Figure 158. Riser 1 assembly installation




Figure 159. Riser 2 assembly installation




Figure 160. Opening the PCIe adapter retention latch





Figure 161. Removing a PCIe adapter from the riser assembly




Figure 162. Removing a PCIe adapter from the system board






Figure 163. PCIe adapter installation




Figure 164. Closing the PCIe adapter retention latch




Figure 165. Installing a PCIe adapter on the system board






Figure 166. V100 GPU air baffle removal




Figure 167. GPU holder removal






Figure 168. P4 GPU air baffle removal




Figure 173. GPU bracket and holder installation






Figure 174. P4 GPU air baffle installation




Figure 179. Middle plate removal




Figure 180. V100 GPU air baffle installation






Figure 181. Rear hot-swap drive assembly removal




Figure 182. Rear hot-swap drive assembly installation






Figure 183. LOM adapter removal




Figure 184. LOM adapter installation






Figure 185. Serial port module removal




Figure 186. Serial port module installation







Figure 187. M.2 drive air baffle removal




Figure 188. M.2 backplane removal




Figure 189. M.2 drive removal





Figure 190. M.2 retainer adjustment




Figure 191. M.2 drive slot




Figure 192. M.2 drive installation




Figure 193. Instruction for sliding the retainer




Figure 194. M.2 backplane installation




Figure 195. M.2 drive air baffle installation




Figure 197. CMA adjustment




Figure 198. Hot-swap power supply removal




Figure 200. CMA adjustment




Figure 201. Hot-swap power supply filler removal




Figure 202. Hot-swap power supply installation




Figure 203. TCM/TPM adapter removal




Figure 204. TCM/TPM adapter installation




Figure 205. Removing a PHM




Figure 206. Separating a heat sink from a processor




Figure 207. Removing a processor retainer




Figure 208. Installing a processor retainer

- 1) Position the processor on the new retainer so that the triangular marks align; then, insert the unmarked end of the processor into the retainer.
- 2) Holding the inserted end of the processor in place, flex the opposite end of the retainer down and away from the processor until you can press the processor under the clip on the retainer.
  - To prevent the processor from falling out of the retainer after it is inserted, keep the processor-contact side up and hold the processor-retainer assembly by the sides of the retainer.
- 3) If there is any old thermal grease on the processor, gently clean the top of the processor using an alcohol cleaning pad.

**Note:** If you are applying new thermal grease on the top of the processor, make sure to do it after the alcohol has fully evaporated.

### 3. If you are replacing a processor:

- a. Remove the processor identification label from the heat sink and replace it with the new label that comes with the replacement processor.
- b. To ensure the best performance, check the manufacturing date on the new heat sink and make sure it does not exceed 2 years. Otherwise, wipe off the existing thermal grease and apply the new grease onto it for optimal thermal performance.
- c. Apply new thermal grease (1/2-syringe, 0.65 g) to the top of the new processor. If you have cleaned the top of the processor with an alcohol cleaning pad, make sure to apply the new thermal grease after the alcohol has fully evaporated.




Figure 209. Thermal grease application

4. If you are replacing a heat sink, remove the processor identification label from the old heat sink and place it on the new heat sink in the same location. The label is on the side of the heat sink closest to the triangular alignment mark.

If you are unable to remove the label and place it on the new heat sink, or if the label is damaged during transfer, write the processor serial number from the processor identification label on the new heat sink in the same location as the label would be placed using a permanent marker.

5. Assemble the processor and heat sink, if these components are separate.




Figure 210. Assembling a PHM in the shipping tray




Figure 211. Installing a PHM

- 1. Remove the top cover. See "Remove the top cover" on page 169.
- 2. Remove the air baffle. See "Remove the air baffle" on page 174.
- 3. Remove the system fan cage. See "Remove the system fan cage" on page 182.
- 4. Record where the cables are connected to the system board; then, disconnect all the cables.

**Attention:** Disengage all latches, cable clips, release tabs, or locks on cable connectors beforehand. Failing to release them before removing the cables will damage the cable connectors on the system board. Any damage to the cable connectors may require replacing the system board.

- 5. Remove any of the following components that are installed on the system board and put them in a safe, static-protective place. See the related topics in this chapter.
  - · memory modules
  - LOM adapter
  - M.2 backplane
  - TCM/TPM (for Chinese Mainland only)
  - CMOS battery
  - RAID adapter on the RAID adapter slot
  - PCle adapters
  - Riser assemblies
  - Rear hot-swap drive assembly
  - PHM

**Important:** Do not disassemble the PHM.

6. Pull out the power supplies slightly. Ensure that they are disconnected from the system board.

To remove the system board, complete the following step:

Step 1. Lift the release pin **1** and hold the lifting handle **2** at the same time and slide the system board toward the front of the server. Then, lift the system board out of the chassis.




Figure 212. System board removal

If you are instructed to return the old system board, follow all packaging instructions and use any packaging materials that are provided.

**Important:** Before you return the system board, make sure that you install the processor socket dust covers from the new system board. To replace a processor socket dust cover:

- 1. Take a dust cover from the processor socket assembly on the new system board and orient it correctly above the processor socket assembly on the removed system board.
- 2. Gently press down the dust cover legs to the processor socket assembly, pressing on the edges to avoid damage to the socket pins. You might hear a click on the dust cover is securely attached.
- 3. Make sure that the dust cover is securely attached to the processor socket assembly.

If you are planning to recycle the system board, follow the instructions in "Disassemble the system board for recycle" on page 305 for compliance with local regulations.

To install the system board, complete the following steps:

Step 1. Touch the static-protective package that contains the new system board to any unpainted surface on the outside of the server. Then, take the new system board out of the package and place it on a static-protective surface.

Step 2. Hold the release pin **1** and the lifting handle **2** at the same time to lower the system board into the chassis. Then, slide the system board to the rear of the server.

#### Ensure that:

- The new system board is engaged by the mounting stud 
  on the chassis.
- The rear connectors on the new system board are inserted into the corresponding holes in the rear panel.
- The release pin secures the system board in place.




Figure 213. System board installation

### After installing the system board:

- 4. Update the machine type and serial number with new vital product data (VPD). Use the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager to update the machine type and serial number. See "Update the machine type and serial number" on page 280.
- 5. Enable TPM/TCM. See "Enable TPM/TCM" on page 282.
- 6. Optionally, enable Secure Boot. See "Enable UEFI Secure Boot" on page 285.

# Update the machine type and serial number

After the system board is replaced by trained service technicians, the machine type and serial number must be updated.

There are two methods available to update the machine type and serial number:

From Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager

To update the machine type and serial number from Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager:

- 1. Start the server and press F1 to display the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager interface.
- 2. If the power-on Administrator password is required, enter the password.
- 3. From the System Summary page, click **Update VPD**.

- 4. Update the machine type and serial number.
- From Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI

Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI sets the machine type and serial number in the Lenovo XClarity Controller. Select one of the following methods to access the Lenovo XClarity Controller and set the machine type and serial number:

- Operate from the target system, such as LAN or keyboard console style (KCS) access
- Remote access to the target system (TCP/IP based)

To update the machine type and serial number from Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI:

1. Download and install Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI.

To download Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI, go to the following site:

- 2. Copy and unpack the OneCLI package, which also includes other required files, to the server. Make sure that you unpack the OneCLI and the required files to the same directory.
- 3. After you have Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI in place, type the following commands to set the machine type and serial number:

onecli config set SYSTEM_PROD_DATA.SysInfoProdName <m/t_model> [access_method]
onecli config set SYSTEM_PROD_DATA.SysInfoSerialNum <s/n> [access_method]

#### Where:

<m/t model>

The server machine type and model number. Type mtm xxxxyyy, where xxxx is the machine type and yyy is the server model number.

<s/n>

The serial number on the server. Type sn zzzzzzz, where zzzzzzz is the serial number.

faccess methodi

The access method that you select to use from the following methods:

Online authenticated LAN access, type the command:

```
[--bmc-username <xcc_user_id> --bmc-password <xcc_password>]
```

Where:

xcc user id

The BMC/IMM/XCC account name (1 of 12 accounts). The default value is USERID.

xcc password

The BMC/IMM/XCC account password (1 of 12 accounts).

Example commands are as follows:

```
onecli config set SYSTEM_PROD_DATA.SysInfoProdName <m/t_model> --bmc-username <xcc_user_id>
--bmc-password <xcc_password>
onecli config set SYSTEM_PROD_DATA.SysInfoSerialNum <s/n> --bmc-username <xcc_user_id>
--bmc-password <xcc_password>
```

Online KCS access (unauthenticated and user restricted):

You do not need to specify a value for access\_method when you use this access method.

```
Example commands are as follows:

**Note:** The KCS access method uses the IPMI/KCS interface, which requires that the IPMI driver be installed.

- Remote LAN access, type the command:

```

The BMC/IMM/XCC IP address. There is no default value. This parameter is required.

xcc user id

The BMC/IMM/XCC account (1 of 12 accounts). The default value is USERID.

xcc password

The BMC/IMM/XCC account password (1 of 12 accounts).

**Note:** BMC, IMM, or XCC internal LAN/USB IP address, account name, and password are all valid for this command.

Example commands are as follows:

--bmc <xcc_user_id>:<xcc_password>@<xcc_external_ip>
onecli config set SYSTEM_PROD_DATA.SysInfoSerialNum <s/n>

```

### **Enable TPM/TCM**

The server supports Trusted Platform Module (TPM), Version 1.2 or Version 2.0.

**Note:** For customers in Chinese Mainland, integrated TPM is not supported. However, customers in Chinese Mainland can install a Trusted Cryptographic Module (TCM) adapter or a NationZ TPM adapter (sometimes called a daughter card). Customers in Chinese Mainland should download Lenovo Business Vantage to enable TCM. For more information, see href=https://datacentersupport.lenovo.com/en/en/downloads/ds548665-18alenovo\_business\_vantage\_-release\_letter-\_20171205\_v221770130-for-unknown-os and https://download.lenovo.com/servers/mig/2021/02/09/43299/LBV\_v2.2.177.0130\_readme\_20180903.txt.

When a system board is replaced, you must make sure that the TPM/TCM policy is set correctly.

#### **CAUTION:**

Take special care when setting the TPM/TCM policy. If it is not set correctly, the system board can become unusable.

#### Set the TPM/TCM policy

By default, a replacement system board is shipped with the TPM/TCM policy set to **undefined**. You must modify this setting to match the setting that was in place for the system board that is being replaced.

There are two methods available to set the TPM policy:

From Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager

To set the TPM policy from Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager:

- 1. Start the server and press F1 to display the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager interface.
- 2. If the power-on Administrator password is required, enter the password.
- 3. From the System Summary page, click **Update VPD**.

- 4. Set the policy to one of the following settings.
  - TCM enabled Chinese Mainland only. Customers in Chinese Mainland should choose this setting if a TCM adapter is installed.
  - TPM 2.0 enabled Chinese Mainland only. Customers in Chinese Mainland should choose this setting if a TPM 2.0 adapter is installed.
  - TPM enabled ROW. Customers outside of Chinese Mainland should choose this setting.
  - Permanently disabled. Customers in Chinese Mainland should use this setting if no TPM or TCM adapter is installed.

**Note:** Although the setting **undefined** is available as a policy setting, it should not be used.

• From Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI

**Note:** Please note that a Local IPMI user and password must be setup in Lenovo XClarity Controller for remote accessing to the target system.

To set the TPM policy from Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI:

 Read TpmTcmPolicyLock to check whether the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY has been locked: OneCli.exe config show imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>

**Note:** The imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock value must be 'Disabled', which means TPM\_TCM\_POLICY is NOT locked and changes to the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY are permitted. If the return code is 'Enabled' then no changes to the policy are permitted. The planar may still be used if the desired setting is correct for the system being replaced.

- 2. Configure the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY into XCC:
  - For the customer in Chinese Mainland with no TCM/TPM:
     OneCli.exe config set imm.TpmTcmPolicy "NeitherTpmNorTcm" --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>

    (TCM/TPM module should be moved to the FRU prior to changing policy)

    OneCli.exe config set imm.TpmTcmPolicy "TcmOnly" --override --imm <userid>:cuserid>:cuserid>:cuserid>:cuserid>:cuserid
  - For the customer outside of Chinese Mainland:
     OneCli.exe config set imm.TpmTcmPolicy "TpmOnly" --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>
- 3. Issue reset command to reset system: OneCli.exe misc ospower reboot --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip address></password>@<ip address>
- 4. Read back the value to check whether the change has been accepted: OneCli.exe config show imm.TpmTcmPolicy --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>

#### Notes:

If the read back value is matched it means the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY has been set correctly.

imm.TpmTcmPolicy is defined as below:

- Value 0 use string "Undefined", which means UNDEFINED policy.
- Value 1 use string "NeitherTpmNorTcm", which means TPM\_PERM\_DISABLED.
- Value 2 use string "TpmOnly", which means TPM\_ALLOWED.
- Value 4 use string "TcmOnly", which means TCM\_ALLOWED.
- Below 4 steps must also be used to 'lock' the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY when using OneCli commands:
- 5. Read TpmTcmPolicyLock to check whether the TPM\_TCM\_POLICY has been locked, command as below:

OneCli.exe config show imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip address>

The value must be 'Disabled', it means TPM TCM POLICY is NOT locked and must be set.

6. Lock the TPM TCM POLICY:

OneCli.exe config set imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock "Enabled"--override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>

7. Issue reset command to reset system, command as below:

OneCli.exe misc ospower reboot --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip address>

During the reset, UEFI will read the value from imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock, if the value is 'Enabled' and the imm.TpmTcmPolicy value is invalid, UEFI will lock the TPM TCM POLICY setting.

The valid value for imm.TpmTcmPolicy includes 'NeitherTpmNorTcm', 'TpmOnly' and 'TpmOnly'.

If the imm.TpmTcmPolicy is set as 'Enabled' but imm.TpmTcmPolicy value is invalid, UEFI will reject the 'lock' request and change imm.TpmTcmPolicy back to 'Disabled'.

8. Read back the value to check whether the 'Lock' is accepted or rejected. command as below:

OneCli.exe config show imm.TpmTcmPolicy --override --imm <userid>:<password>@<ip\_address>

**Note:** If the read back value is changed from 'Disabled' to 'Enabled' that means the TPM\_TCM\_ POLICY has been locked successfully. There is no method to unlock a policy once it has been set other than replacing system board.

imm.TpmTcmPolicyLock is defined as below:

Value 1 use string "Enabled", which means lock the policy. Other values are not accepted.

Procedure also requires that Physical Presence is enabled. The Default value for FRU will be enabled. PhysicalPresencePolicyConfiguration.PhysicalPresencePolicy=Enable

### **Assert Physical Presence**

Before you can assert Physical Presence, the Physical Presence Policy must be enabled. By default, the Physical Presence Policy is enabled with a timeout of 30 minutes.

There are two ways to assert the Physical Presence:

- 1. If the Physical Presence Policy is enabled, you can assert Physical Presence through the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager or through the Lenovo XClarity Controller.
- 2. Switch the hardware jumpers on the system board.

**Notes:** If the Physical Presence Policy has been disabled:

- 1. Set the hardware Physical Presence jumper on the system board to assert Physical Presence.
- 2. Enable the Physical Presence Policy using either F1 (UEFI Settings) or Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI.

#### Assert Physical Presence through the Lenovo XClarity Controller

Complete the following steps to assert Physical Presence through the Lenovo XClarity Controller:

1. Log in to the Lenovo XClarity Controller interface.

#### Set the TPM version

To be able to set the TPM version, Physical Presence must be asserted.

The Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager or the Lenovo XClarity Essentials OneCLI can be used to set the TPM version.

#### To set the TPM version:

  - a. Go to http://datacentersupport.lenovo.com and navigate to the support page for your server.

## Complete the parts replacement

Use this information to complete the parts replacement.

To complete the parts replacement, do the following:

- 2. Properly route and secure the cables in the server. Refer to the cable connecting and routing information for each component.
- 3. If you have removed the top cover, reinstall it. See "Install the top cover" on page 170.
- 4. Reconnect external cables and power cords to the server.

**Attention:** To avoid component damage, connect the power cords last.

**Note:** Make sure the latest version of ThinkSystem M.2 with Mirroring Enablement Kit Firmware is applied to avoid virtual disk/array missing after system board replacement.

## **Chapter 4. Problem determination**

Use the information in this section to isolate and resolve issues that you might encounter while using your server.

Lenovo servers can be configured to automatically notify Lenovo Support if certain events are generated. You can configure automatic notification, also known as Call Home, from management applications, such as the Lenovo XClarity Administrator. If you configure automatic problem notification, Lenovo Support is automatically alerted whenever a server encounters a potentially significant event.

To isolate a problem, you should typically begin with the event log of the application that is managing the server:

- If you are managing the server from the Lenovo XClarity Administrator, begin with the Lenovo XClarity Administrator event log.
- If you are using some other management application, begin with the Lenovo XClarity Controller event log.

## **Event logs**

An *alert* is a message or other indication that signals an event or an impending event. Alerts are generated by the Lenovo XClarity Controller or by UEFI in the servers. These alerts are stored in the Lenovo XClarity Controller Event Log. If the server is managed by the Chassis Management Module 2 or by the Lenovo XClarity Administrator, alerts are automatically forwarded to those management applications.

#### **Lenovo XClarity Administrator event log**




Figure 214. Lenovo XClarity Administrator event log

#### Lenovo XClarity Controller event log

The Lenovo XClarity Controller monitors the physical state of the server and its components using sensors that measure internal physical variables such as temperature, power-supply voltages, fan speeds, and component status. The Lenovo XClarity Controller provides various interfaces to systems management software and to system administrators and users to enable remote management and control of a server.

The Lenovo XClarity Controller monitors all components of the server and posts events in the Lenovo XClarity Controller event log.




Figure 215. Lenovo XClarity Controller event log

## **Light path diagnostics**

Light path diagnostics is a system of LEDs on various external and internal components of the server that leads you to the failed component. When an error occurs, LEDs are lit on the front I/O assembly, the rear panel, the system board, and the failed component. By viewing the following LEDs, you can often identify the system and device status and diagnose problems.

- "Front I/O assembly" on page 26
- "Rear view LEDs" on page 31

## **General problem determination procedures**

Use the information in this section to resolve problems if the event log does not contain specific errors or the server is inoperative.

If you are not sure about the cause of a problem and the power supplies are working correctly, complete the following steps to attempt to resolve the problem:

- 1. Turn off the server.
- 2. Make sure that the server is cabled correctly.
- 3. Remove or disconnect the following devices if applicable, one at a time, until you find the failure. Turn on and configure the server each time you remove or disconnect a device.
  - Any external devices,
  - Surge-suppressor device (on the server).
  - Printer, mouse, and non-Lenovo devices,
  - Each adapter.
  - · Hard disk drives.
  - Memory modules until you reach the minimum configuration that is supported for the server.

Note: For minimal configuration for debugging, see "Specifications" on page 3.

4. Turn on the server.

If the problem is solved when you remove an adapter from the server, but the problem recurs when you install the same adapter again, suspect the adapter. If the problem recurs when you replace the adapter with a different one, try a different PCle slot.

If the problem appears to be a networking problem and the server passes all system tests, suspect a network cabling problem that is external to the server.

## Resolving suspected power problems

Power problems can be difficult to solve. For example, a short circuit can exist anywhere on any of the power distribution buses. Usually, a short circuit will cause the power subsystem to shut down because of an overcurrent condition.

Complete the following steps to diagnose and resolve a suspected power problem.

Step 1. Check the event log and resolve any errors related to the power.

**Note:** Start with the event log of the application that is managing the server. For more information about event logs, see "Event logs" on page 287.

Step 2. Check for short circuits, for example, if a loose screw is causing a short circuit on a circuit board.

- Step 3. Remove the adapters and disconnect the cables and power cords to all internal and external devices until the server is at the minimum configuration that is required for the server to start. See "Specifications" on page 3 to determine the minimum configuration for your server.
- Step 4. Reconnect all ac power cords and turn on the server. If the server starts successfully, reseat the adapters and devices one at a time until the problem is isolated.

If the server does not start from the minimum configuration, replace the components in the minimum configuration one at a time until the problem is isolated.

## Resolving suspected Ethernet controller problems

The method that you use to test the Ethernet controller depends on which operating system you are using. See the operating-system documentation for information about Ethernet controllers, and see the Ethernet controller device-driver readme file.

Complete the following steps to attempt to resolve suspected problems with the Ethernet controller.

- Step 1. Make sure that the correct device drivers, which come with the server are installed and that they are at the latest level.
- Step 2. Make sure that the Ethernet cable is installed correctly.
  - The cable must be securely attached at all connections. If the cable is attached but the problem remains, try a different cable.
  - If you set the Ethernet controller to operate at 100 Mbps or 1000 Mbps, you must use Category 5 cabling.
- Step 3. Determine whether the hub supports auto-negotiation. If it does not, try configuring the integrated Ethernet controller manually to match the speed and duplex mode of the hub.
- Step 4. Check the Ethernet controller LEDs on the rear panel of the server. These LEDs indicate whether there is a problem with the connector, cable, or hub.
  - The Ethernet link status LED is lit when the Ethernet controller receives a link pulse from the hub. If the LED is off, there might be a defective connector or cable or a problem with the hub.
  - The Ethernet transmit/receive activity LED is lit when the Ethernet controller sends or receives data over the Ethernet network. If the Ethernet transmit/receive activity is off, make sure that the hub and network are operating and that the correct device drivers are installed.
- Step 5. Check the Network activity LED on the rear of the server. The Network activity LED is lit when data is active on the Ethernet network. If the Network activity LED is off, make sure that the hub and network are operating and that the correct device drivers are installed.
- Step 6. Check for operating-system-specific causes of the problem, and also make sure that the operating system drivers are installed correctly.
- Step 7. Make sure that the device drivers on the client and server are using the same protocol.

If the Ethernet controller still cannot connect to the network but the hardware appears to be working, the network administrator must investigate other possible causes of the error.

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

- 1. If the server has been installed, moved, or serviced recently, or if this is the first time the embedded hypervisor is being used, make sure that the device is connected properly and that there is no physical damage to the connectors.
- 2. See the documentation that comes with the optional embedded hypervisor flash device for setup and configuration information.
- 3. Check https://static.lenovo.com/us/en/serverproven/index.shtml to validate that the embedded hypervisor device is supported for the server.
- 4. Make sure that the embedded hypervisor device is listed in the list of available boot options. From the management controller user interface, click **Server Configuration** → **Boot Options**.

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

- 1. Make sure that the power button on the server is working correctly:
  - a. Disconnect the server power cords.
  - b. Reconnect the server power cords.
  - c. Reseat the operator information panel cable, and then repeat steps a and b.
    - If the server starts, reseat the operator information panel.

- If the problem remains, replace the operator information panel.
- 2. Make sure that:
  - The power cords are correctly connected to the server and to a working electrical outlet.
  - The LEDs on the power supply do not indicate a problem.
- 3. Reseat the power supplies.
- 4. Replace each power supply, restarting the server each time:
  - · memory modules
  - Power supplies
- 5. If you just installed an optional device, remove it, and restart the server. If the server starts, you might have installed more devices than the power supply supports.

#### Server does not power on

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

- 1. Check the event log for any events related to the server not powering on.
- 2. Check for any LEDs that are flashing amber.
- 3. Check the power LED on the system board.
- 4. Reseat the power supply.
- 5. Replace the power supply.

#### Server does not turn off

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

- 1. Determine whether you are using an Advanced Configuration and Power Interface (ACPI) or a non-ACPI operating system. If you are using a non-ACPI operating system, complete the following steps:
  - a. Press Ctrl+Alt+Delete.
  - b. Turn off the server by pressing the power button and holding it down for 5 seconds.
  - c. Restart the server.
  - d. If the server fails POST and the power button does not work, disconnect the power cord for 20 seconds; then, reconnect the power cord and restart the server.
- 2. If the problem remains or if you are using an ACPI-aware operating system, suspect the system board.

#### Displayed system memory less than installed physical memory

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

**Note:** Each time you install or remove a memory module, you must disconnect the server from the power source; then, wait 10 seconds before restarting the server.

1. Make sure that:

- No error LEDs are lit on the operator information panel.
- Memory mirrored channel does not account for the discrepancy.
- The memory modules are seated correctly.
- You have installed the correct type of memory.
- If you changed the memory, you updated the memory configuration in the Setup utility.
- All banks of memory are enabled. The server might have automatically disabled a memory bank when it detected a problem, or a memory bank might have been manually disabled.
- There is no memory mismatch when the server is at the minimum memory configuration.
- When DCPMMs are installed:
  - a. If the memory is set in App Direct or Mixed Memory Mode, all the saved data have been backed up, and created namespaces are deleted before any DCPMM is replaced.
  - b. Refer to "Intel Optane DC Persistent Memory (DCPMM) setup" in *Setup Guide* and see if the displayed memory fits the mode description.
  - c. If DCPMMs are recently set in Memory Mode, turn it back to App Direct Mode and examine if there is namespace that has not been deleted (see "Intel Optane DC Persistent Memory (DCPMM) setup" in Setup Guide).
  - d. Go to the Setup Utility, select **System Configuration and Boot Management** → **Intel Optane DCPMMs** → **Security**, and make sure all the DCPMM units are unlocked.
- 2. Reseat the memory modules, and then restart the server.
- 3. Check the POST error log:
  - If a memory module was disabled by a systems-management interrupt (SMI), replace the memory module.
  - If a memory module was disabled by the user or by POST, reseat the memory module; then, run the Setup utility and enable the memory module.
- 4. Run memory diagnostics. Power on the system and press **F1** when the logo screen appears, the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager interface will start. Perform memory diagnostics with this interface. Go to **Diagnostics** → **Run Diagnostic** → **Memory test** or **DCPMM test**.

When DCPMMs are installed, run diagnostics based on the current DCPMM mode:

- App Direct Mode
  - Run **DCPMM Test** for DCPMMs.
  - Run Memory Test for DRAM DIMMs.
- Memory Mode and Mixed Memory Mode
  - Run **DCPMM Test** for App Direct capacity of DCPMMs.
  - Run **Memory Test** for memory capacity of DCPMMs.

**Note:** DRAM DIMMs in these two modes act as cache, and are not applicable to memory diagnostics.

5. Reverse the modules between the channels (of the same processor), and then restart the server. If the problem is related to a memory module, replace the failing memory module.

Note: When DCPMMs are installed, only adopt this method in Memory Mode.

- 6. Re-enable all memory modules using the Setup Utility, and restart the system.
- 7. (Trained technician only) Install the failing memory module into a memory module connector for processor 2 (if installed) to verify that the problem is not the processor or the memory module connector.

#### Multiple memory modules in a channel identified as failing

**Note:** Each time you install or remove a memory module, you must disconnect the solution from the power source; then, wait 10 seconds before restarting the solution.

- 1. Reseat the memory modules; then, restart the solution.
- 2. Remove the highest-numbered memory module of those that are identified and replace it with an identical known good memory module; then, restart the solution. Repeat as necessary. If the failures continue after all identified memory modules are replaced, go to step 4.
- 3. Return the removed memory modules, one at a time, to their original connectors, restarting the solution after each memory module, until a memory module fails. Replace each failing memory module with an identical known good memory module, restarting the solution after each memory module replacement. Repeat step 3 until you have tested all removed memory modules.
- 4. Replace the highest-numbered memory module of those identified; then, restart the solution. Repeat as necessary.
- 5. Reverse the memory modules between the channels (of the same processor), and then restart the solution. If the problem is related to a memory module, replace the failing memory module.
- 6. (Trained technician only) Install the failing memory module into a memory module connector for processor 2 (if installed) to verify that the problem is not the processor or the memory module connector.
- 7. (Trained technician only) Replace the system board.

#### Attempt to change to another DCPMM mode fails

After the DCPMM mode is changed and the system is successfully restarted, if the DCPMM mode stays the same instead of being changed, check the DRAM DIMMs and DCPMM capacity to see if it meets the requirement of the new mode (see "Intel Optane DC Persistent Memory (DCPMM) setup" in *Setup Guide*).

#### Extra namespace appears in an interleaved region

If there are two created namespaces in one interleaved region, VMware ESXi ignores the created namespaces and creates an extra new namespace during system booting. To solve this problem, delete the created namespaces in either the Setup Utility or the operating system before the first booting with ESXi.

- 2. If the LED is lit, remove the drive from the bay, wait 45 seconds, and reinsert the drive, making sure that the drive assembly connects to the hard disk drive backplane.
- 3. Observe the associated green hard disk drive activity LED and the yellow status LED:
  - If the green activity LED is flashing and the yellow status LED is not lit, the drive is recognized by the controller and is working correctly. Run the diagnostics tests for the hard disk drives. When you start

a server and press F1, the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager interface is displayed by default. You can perform hard disk drive diagnostics from this interface. From the Diagnostic page, click **Run Diagnostic** → **HDD test**.

- If the green activity LED is flashing and the yellow status LED is flashing slowly, the drive is recognized by the controller and is rebuilding.
- If neither LED is lit or flashing, check the hard disk drive backplane.
- If the green activity LED is flashing and the yellow status LED is lit, replace the drive. If the activity of the LEDs remains the same, go to step Hard disk drive problems. If the activity of the LEDs changes, return to step 1.
- 4. Make sure that the hard disk drive backplane is correctly seated. When it is correctly seated, the drive assemblies correctly connect to the backplane without bowing or causing movement of the backplane.
- 5. Reseat the backplane power cable and repeat steps 1 through 3.
- 6. Reseat the backplane signal cable and repeat steps 1 through 3.
- 7. Suspect the backplane signal cable or the backplane:
  - Replace the affected backplane signal cable.
  - Replace the affected backplane.
- 8. Run the diagnostics tests for the hard disk drives. When you start a server and press F1, the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager interface is displayed by default. You can perform hard disk drive diagnostics from this interface. From the Diagnostic page, click **Run Diagnostic** → **HDD test**.

#### Based on those tests:

- If the adapter passes the test but the drives are not recognized, replace the backplane signal cable and run the tests again.
- Replace the backplane.
- If the adapter fails the test, disconnect the backplane signal cable from the adapter and run the tests again.
- If the adapter fails the test, replace the adapter.

#### Multiple hard disk drives fail

#### Incorrect characters are displayed

- 1. If the server is attached to a KVM switch, bypass the KVM switch to eliminate it as a possible cause of the problem: connect the monitor cable directly to the correct connector on the rear of the server.

3. If you are using a USB hub, disconnect the USB device from the hub and connect it directly to the server.

#### Insufficient PCIe resources are detected.

- 1. Remove one of the PCle adapters.
- 2. Restart the system and press F1 to display the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager system setup interface.

#### System error LED is on and event log "Power supply has lost input" is displayed

#### Cannot wake server using Wake on LAN

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

- If you are using the dual-port network adapter and the server is connected to the network using Ethernet 5 connector, check the system-error log or IMM2 system event log (see "Event logs" on page 287), make sure:
  - a. Fan 3 is running in standby mode, if Emulex dual port 10GBase-T embedded adapter is installed.
  - b. The room temperature is not too high (see "Specifications" on page 3).
  - c. The air vents are not blocked.
  - d. The air baffle is installed securely.
- 2. Reseat the dual-port network adapter.
- 3. Turn off the server and disconnect it from the power source; then, wait 10 seconds before restarting the server.
- 4. If the problem still remains, replace the dual-port network adapter.

#### Could not log in using LDAP account with SSL enabled

Complete the following steps until the problem is resolved:

- 1. Make sure that the license key is valid.
- 2. Generate a new license key and log in again.

#### The server immediately displays the POST Event Viewer when it is turned on

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

- 1. Correct any errors that are indicated by the light path diagnostics LEDs.
- 2. Make sure that the server supports all the processors and that the processors match in speed and cache size.

- 3. (Trained technician only) Make sure that Processor 1 is seated correctly.

- b. (Trained technician only) System board

#### Server is unresponsive (POST is complete and operating system is running)

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

- If you are in the same location as the compute node, complete the following steps:
  - 1. If you are using a KVM connection, make sure that the connection is operating correctly. Otherwise, make sure that the keyboard and mouse are operating correctly.
  - 2. If possible, log in to the compute node and verify that all applications are running (no applications are hung).
  - 3. Restart the compute node.
  - 4. If the problem remains, make sure that any new software has been installed and configured correctly.
  - 5. Contact your place of purchase of the software or your software provider.
- If you are accessing the compute node from a remote location, complete the following steps:
  - 1. Make sure that all applications are running (no applications are hung).
  - 2. Attempt to log out of the system and log back in.
  - 3. Validate the network access by pinging or running a trace route to the compute node from a command line.
    - a. If you are unable to get a response during a ping test, attempt to ping another compute node in the enclosure to determine whether it is a connection problem or compute node problem.
    - b. Run a trace route to determine where the connection breaks down. Attempt to resolve a connection issue with either the VPN or the point at which the connection breaks down.
  - 4. Restart the compute node remotely through the management interface.
  - 5. If the problem remains, verify that any new software has been installed and configured correctly.
  - 6. Contact your place of purchase of the software or your software provider.

#### Server is unresponsive (cannot press F1 to start System Setup)

Configuration changes, such as added devices or adapter firmware updates, and firmware or application code problems can cause the server to fail POST (the power-on self-test).

If this occurs, the server responds in either of the following ways:

- The server restarts automatically and attempts POST again.
- The server hangs, and you must manually restart the server for the server to attempt POST again.

After a specified number of consecutive attempts (automatic or manual), the server to reverts to the default UEFI configuration and starts System Setup so that you can make the necessary corrections to the configuration and restart the server. If the server is unable to successfully complete POST with the default configuration, there might be a problem with the system board.

You can specify the number of consecutive restart attempts in System Setup. Restart the server and press F1 to display the Lenovo XClarity Provisioning Manager system setup interface. Then, click **System Settings** → **Recovery and RAS** → **POST Attempts** → **POST Attempts Limit**. Available options are 3, 6, 9, and disable.

#### Voltage system board fault is displayed in the event log

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

- 1. Revert the system to the minimum configuration. See "Specifications" on page 3 for the minimally required number of processors and memory modules.
- 2. Restart the system.
  - If the system restarts, add each of the items that you removed one at a time, restarting the system each time, until the error occurs. Replace the item for which the error occurs.
  - If the system does not restart, suspect the system board.

#### **Unusual smell**

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

- 1. An unusual smell might be coming from newly installed equipment.
- 2. If the problem remains, contact Lenovo Support.

#### Server seems to be running hot

Complete the following steps until the problem is solved.

Multiple compute nodes or chassis:

- 1. Make sure that the room temperature is within the specified range (see "Specifications" on page 3).
- 2. Check the management processor event log for rising temperature events. If there are no events, the compute node is running within normal operating temperatures. Note that you can expect some variation in temperature.




Figure 216. Disassembling the system board

  - 14 torx screws on the PHM bolster plates 7 8 (with T20 torx screwdriver)
  - Four PH2 captive screws on the heat sink (with PH2 screwdriver)
  - Four plastic rivets on two internal raid holder 3 4 (with screwdriver)
  - Four standoffs (with 7 mm wrench)
  - Two hexagon bolts on VGA connector (with 5 mm wrench)
  - One plunger (with 11 mm and 16 mm wrench)
- Step 2. Separate the components 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 from the system board.

After disassembling the system board, comply with local regulations when recycling.
